Little Italy Quality of Life Committee (QLC): Supporting revitalization in the Little Italy Neighborhood

As a result of discussion at the August 2013 South Central Neighborhood Watch/Troy Little Italy Neighborhood meeting, a group of individuals decided to form a distinct action oriented group to directly address quality of life issues within the neighborhood. The new group would have its own identity. The individuals involved in the discussion were Josh Chiappone, Sam Chiappone (Facilitator), Andrea Daley (South Central Neighborhood Watch), Michael Esposito, Dan Franklin, Sam Judge, George

Regan, Ken Rose, Denise Saint Onge, and Donald Windelspecht.

To gain an understanding of the issues facing the neighborhood, the group held an open meeting in early September 2013 at the Italian Community Center (ICC) to obtain input from neighbors on the committee's charter and quality of life issues. Approximately twenty individuals were present for the meeting including Marion Field, President, Troy Little Italy.

The overall consensus of the group was to define the QLC as an action oriented group targeting specific areas and behaviors for improvement as defined by the committee. The ability for the committee to

make an impact will be linked to starting with obtainable action items, which are clearly defined in an active punch list, and building on successes of the group. This approach is similar to the "broken window" theory which states you fix small problems before they become major. QLC meeting were held within a one-hour time period and provided monthly reports at neighborhood meetings.

The first meeting of the QLC was held on September 19, 2013. Topics of concentration included city administration and elected official's relations, community police and patrol involvement, landlord relations, community outreach efforts, vacant property issues, and code relations.

Marion Field was a member of the active group up to her passing in May 2016. With the passing of Marion Field, and no plan in place for Troy Little Italy to continue, the QLC decided to take on the Little Italy Newsletter (Mike Esposito as editor) and the organization of the monthly neighborhood meetings (Sam Chiappone). The QLC felt both of these items are crucial communication tools that needed to continue as part of the neighborhood revitalization efforts. The QLC continues to facilitate discussion and meetings with other neighborhood groups as needed and welcomes the opportunity to work and collaborate with all who strive to revitalize our city.

Since 2013 the QLC has partnered with the 11th Ward WWII Monument Committee to maintain the 1st and 11th Ward WWII veteran's monuments located in our neighborhood. We have been successful in writing proposals and receiving Neighborhood Improvement Program grants from the Troy City Council to maintain the sites. Both the 11th Ward WWII monument and the 1st Ward WWII monument were rededicated (respectively in 2010 and 2011) after renovation projects which were ed by members of Boy Scout Troop 502 working with our neighborhood organization were completed.

During much of 2018, QLC members with the support of the Italian Community Center, the Ciccarelli-Rea-Agars-Bevevino Veterans Post, the Eleventh Ward WWII Veterans Memorial Committee, and the city administration, planned for the installation of an 8th Ward WWII Veterans Memorial (dedicated Veterans Day 2018) which added a third site to the list of WWII memorials in Little Italy. The successful funding campaign included a Neighborhood Improvement Program grant from the City Council and generous donations from the ICC, CRAB Club, Troy Police Benevolent Association and Troy Uniform Firefighters Association.



The above photo shows volunteers along with Eric Wigand installing the 8th Ward WWII Memorial at the 5th Avenue site overlooking the Hill Street Market Place. The two earlier dedication ceremonies and the 8th Ward WWII Memorial dedication drew three to four hundred families and friends to each of the ceremonies. The sites are maintained with assistance from the Red Front Restaurant and Tavern, Caprara's Auto Body Shop, the Rensselaer County Sheriffs Work Release Program and the 11th Ward WWII Monument Committee.



Since 2015, the QLC and Pat Miele past president of Troy's Italian Community Center, have been cosponsoring an Annual Bocce Tournament held at the ICC which also includes a Ziti and meatball lunch. The event is a friendly competition among ten teams and raises funds used to support programs and events organized by the QLC


The QLC continues the commitment to recognize the importance of the historic Hill Street Market Place and in 2019 installed a an interpretive sign at the corner of Fifth Avenue and Liberty Street describing its history (shown in the above photo.) Funding for the sign was from the 2019 Troy City Council Neighborhood Improvement Program & Troy Capital Resources Corporation and a generous donation from the DelGiacco Family former residents of Havermans Avenue, Troy. Staff and resources provided by the Rensselaer County Historical Society, the Troy Public Library, and the Hudson Mohawk Industrial Gateway were available to Troy artist and historian William Skerritt and neighborhood historian Michael Esposito in researching the history of the Hill Street site.

Also completed in 2019 was a report on the site issued by Mike Esposito.

The Hill Street Market Place: Its History and Future

Decorating the historic Hill Street Market Place with Christmas Lights is now an annual event since Andrea Daley first created the huge, colorful wreath in 2017. Dan Franklin, Dan Lennon, Seamus Donnelly and Heather Hamlin are among those on hand to organize and set up the lights, wreath, and trees. All are Board members of the Little Italy Quality of Life Committee. Denise Saint Onge (also a Board member) and her husband Larry and Dan Franklin designed "light trees" used during the past two years. Each year new pieces are added to the festive holiday display.

The Nativity Creche, shown below, a focal point for many years during Christmas services at the former St. Mary's Church, is displayed annually in the window of Little Italy businesses, first at Cuozzo's Grocery, then at Regan's US Track & Field Office and in recent years at Michele's Floral Design Shop. The crèche was entrusted to Ida Street's Chiappone family in 2010 at the closing of St. Mary's Parish.

In 2017 QLC sponsored a Nativity Restoration Project with the assistance of restoration specialist Andrea Daley, a former St. Mary's parishioner. Andrea, working with several local artists, organized and supervised the project restoration of all 15 pieces of the Cheche.





Since 2011, Little Italy has presented a "Best Rehab" award (originated as an idea by Little Italy supporter David Graham) - a plaque and notoriety for those whose work has improved the Little Italy area. Nominations are open and encouraged for the award for 2020/21. The QLC partnered with other groups to restore the Hill Street walking path to Prospect Park in 2018. The dedication of the "Garnet Douglass Baltimore Trail" in recognition of the first African-American engineer and graduate of Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute (1881) was held at the entrance of the recently-restored walking trail at the Little Italy site on Hill Street – where the above sign was installed -





The two posters shown above, "Troy Doors" on the left and "Good Neighbor" on the right, were created in 2018 by QLC member Denise Saint-Onge, a visual artist and 4th Street art gallery owner. All sale receipts from the sale of the posters help support programs and event sponsored by the QLC.

The highlight of 2020 was approval by the Troy City Council in May of last year to use Community Development Block Grant Improvements for 4th Street. Over the past seven-plus years the QLC has proposed a plan to city government to revitalize 4th Street north of the Poestenkill Canal with funds secured from the CDBG Program administered by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development.

The QLC used previous city street revitalization projects and guidance from the city administration and staff as a model for the proposal. The 4th Street project is important to all because the street is a primary route into the City of Troy for vehicle,

bicycle, and pedestrian traffic. For many prospective new residents, homeowners, businesses, and visitors it is their first impression of our city.

The effort shows the commitment we all share in the importance of neighborhood revitalization. Little Italy projects will receive \$1,186,577 in the upcoming five-year HUD. Phase 1 & 2 will consist of targeted infrastructure improvements, and neighborhood quality of life improvements including, sidewalks and curbing replacement, milling and paving, streetscape improvements, public safety, and neighborhood park improvements starting on 3rd Street from Canal to Adams Street and on 4th Street from Canal to Division Street heading north.



Phase One of the project is currently underway involving 4th Street and 3rd Street from Ida to Adams.

We were pleased to accommodate both the City Administration and the City Council in hosting several well attended public meetings on "Government on the Road," "Mt. Ida Dam" and "CDBG five-year plan information." We are also working to partner with other neighborhood groups on community meetings. In April 2021, the QLC partnering with the Riverside and Osgood neighborhood groups and with assistance from Joe Fama, former Executive Director TAP, Inc., sponsored Transforming South and South Central Troy; A conversation with Mr. Gene Bunnell. Mr. Bunnell, author of "Transforming Providence," is an urban planner with years of applied experience at the local government level. The Zoom program was moderated by Marissa Jacques, anchor Spectrum

This year the major priority for the Quality of Life Committee is focus on the historic Hill Street Market Place site. The site is owned by the City of Troy we are an advocate for the public place which we refer to as "our great good space."

The "Realize Troy Comprehensive Plan" dated May 2018 cites the Market Place specifically in its documentation - SC8: Preserve the history of the former Hill Street Market site located between Liberty and Washington Streets in Troy's Little Italy neighborhood and introduce enhancements to the site. This may include: • Designating the site as a neighborhood public space for entertainment, sporting events, festivals, car shows, reunions, and other family-friendly social activities; Incorporating street trees, landscaping, pedestrian amenities and a permanent stage platform in a corner of the site to improve the image of the areas to support greater activity.

Advising us in planning on the Little Italy Market Re-Design and Improvement Project is Barbara Nelson, Executive Director of Troy Architectural Program (TAP, Inc.) Our July 21st neighborhood meeting will present concepts that have been developed by TAP from resident input dating starting back to 2019 for improving the space, and making the space more usable to more residents. Tours of the market will be held after the meeting for those who haven't visited lately.

We are grateful for the cooperation and generosity of the business community and residents of Little Italy. Support is given by government officials on all levels, community agencies and organizations, the news media, our adjacent neighborhood associations and the Troy community at large as we continue our efforts to stabilize the neighborhood, share our culture and create a heritage tourism destination. Stickball tournament a success



The 13th Annual Stickball Tournament was held on June 13th at the historic Hill Street Market Place Rocco DeFazio, originator of the tournament, Kevin O'Connor, is greeted by Executive Director of Joseph's House & Shelter, and U. S. Congressman Paul Tonko.

The event is held each year to support the work of local organization Joseph's House & Shelter founded in 1983 as a Troy community-based, not-for-profit corporation that provides a continuum of homeless services to residents of Rensselaer County. Joseph's House offers emergency shelter, street outreach, and support services to homeless and formerly homeless individuals, youth, and families, with a focus on providing non-judgmental services where each guest's dignity and worth are recognized and respected.

Since 2008 tens of thousands of dollars have been raised for local food pantries and each year their shelves have been filled with food items from donations brought to the tournament.

Earlier this month representatives from the Stick It to Child Homelessness Stickball Tournament and Joseph's House & Shelter presented the Golden Stickball Award to two Vietnam Purple Heart veterans, Bill Sage, of Troy, and Pat DeStefano, of Red Hook, in recognition of their many years of service and donations to Joseph's House & Shelter. Bill and Pat are joined in the photo at the ceremony by Troy Mayor Pat Madden and Rocco DeFazio.

Christopher's House Opens

The Capital District Women Veteran's Program, Inc. will be a transitional house for homeless women veterans. Christopher's House will provide: a woman's program for women by women, a safe, structured, homelike environment which will lead to self-sustaining independent living, 2 to 3 living spaces for young children, encouragement in advancement of education, mentoring in job placement, transportation for job search and VA appointments and activities of daily living. Each woman will receive assistance from a case manager to develop an individualized treatment plan to assist them in making their way in the world with confidence and a sense of self-worth.

The project is in memory of MAJ. Christopher Rem, husband of COL. Christine Rem (Ret.) the Executive Director of the Capital District Women Veteran's Program who shared his dream for her maternal family's original home in South Troy. COL Rem passed away in October, 2012.

Christine is a retired Army Nurse and an Operation Iraqi Freedom woman veteran who, along with a board mainly consisting of retired Army nurses, formed CDWV.

South Troy pool, splash pads to open

Mayor Patrick Madden announced the South Troy Swimming Pool will open to the public on Tuesday, July 6th, at 12:00 p.m. The pool – located on South Troy Pool Lane – will be open for open swimming daily, from 12:00 noon – 7:00 pm.

Access to the pool will be limited to Troy residents <u>only</u>. Children under the age of 18 must be accompanied by an adult.

The City of Troy is partnering with the Boys and Girls Clubs of the Capital Area (BGCCA) to operate the facility for the 2021 season. BGCCA will provide lifeguards and offer swimming lessons and free lunch programs. The free lunch program will be available Monday through Friday, from 1 - 2:00 pm, for children ages 17 and under. More information on swim lesson registration will be announced at a later date.

The pool is expected to close for the season on Sunday, August 29th

Splash Pads

City-operated splash pads and fountains are open daily from sunrise to sunset, with the exception of Riverfront Park which will operate from 10 am - 8 pm, and the South Troy Pool splash pad which will be available during operating hours. Admission is free at all City-operated splash pads.

Troy Police Chief Owens to retire

Upon hearing of Chief Brian Owens retirement Mayor Madden said, "On behalf of the City of Troy, I extend my appreciation and gratitude to Chief Owens for his nearly quarter-century of service to our community, neighborhoods, families, and nation. He leaves the Troy Police Department a better, more responsive agency that is prepared to meet the challenges facing law enforcement agencies in the 21st century. I wish Brian and the entire Owens family the best as they begin this new and exciting chapter in their lives."

During his tenure, Chief Owens was responsible for a major modernization of the department, including deployment of body-worn cameras, expansion of the community policing philosophy, implementation of new officer trainings, and updates to the department's Use of Force policy.

Chief Owens is a 23- year veteran of the Troy Police Department. Owens previously held leadership positions as Patrol Sergeant, Patrol Captain, Detective Sergeant, Technology and Grants Captain and Assistant Chief of Patrol, the department's Homeland Security Team, Honor Guard and Mobile Command Center. He is a graduate of the FBI National Academy and is a highly-decorated member of the department. Owens is a veteran with the 14 years of service with the United States Army Reserve serving in various capacities including Company Commander of the HHD, 413th Quartermaster Battalion during the unit's combat deployment to Iraq.

Mayor Madden announced the promotion of Deputy Chief Daniel P. DeWolf to Chief of Police. DeWolf has served with the Troy Police Department since 1995.

Rental assistance available

In the event that you, or anyone you know, has tenants in arrears due to the pandemic, the following information may be helpful to you:

A Rental assistance program through NYS started on 6/1/21 and applications are now being accepted. The NYS court system is facing a similar challenge that hospitals had during the peak season of the virus. There are not enough resources in the system to handle all of the eviction proceedings that will be filed. The program is for tenants and landlords and hopefully will reduce the strain on the system and assist tenants and landlords with the challenges. The website is:

Additionally. Unity House in Troy is offering direct assistance to people (by appointment) and helping tenants with the paperwork for that program. Their number is (518) 272-5917.



We remember . . .



Daniel J. Honsinger Sr., 73 of Troy, passed on June 7, 2021, in the comfort of his home surrounded by his loving family. Born in Troy, he was the son of the late David and Mary McGuire Honsinger; and the loving husband of the late Anne M. Barnes Honsinger. Mr. Honsinger served our country proudly with the U.S. Army during the Vietnam War. According t the Troy Military Banner website "while deployed in South Vietnam, Honsinger faced daily encounters with guerilla warfare. Following seven months of overseas battle, Dan was severely wounded in combat due to an enemy mine explosion. He spent nine months at Walter Reed Army Medical Center in Washington, D.C. recovering from his injuries and retired from the Army because of his disabilities on Jan 27, 1969. To honor his immeasurable bravery, Dan was awarded the Purple Heart and Bronze Battle Star, along with the New York State Conspicuous Service Cross and Citation, the

Vietnam Service Medal, the National Defense Service Medal, the Republic of Vietnam Campaign Medal, the Combat Infantryman's Badge and the Sharpshooter Rifle Badge. He was a lifetime member of The Military Order of the Purple Heart and a member of The American Legion of Wynantskill, N.Y.



Dan was employed by the United States Postal Service for over 40 years until his retirement in 2003. Survivors include his children, Daniel J. Jr. (Meg) Honsinger, Paul F. (Karen) Honsinger, and Timothy C. (Kristina) Honsinger; beloved grandchildren, Emily, Daniel, Reese, Anna, Myles, Rylee, Grayson and Kamryn; and siblings, David (Donna) Honsinger, Mary (George) Henkel, Karen (late Bruce) Charbonneau and Dennis Honsinger. He was predeceased by his brother Thomas Honsinger. He is also survived by his sister-in-law Corinne Cosgrave-Honsinger; and his loving companion Maureen Filarecki along with many nieces, nephews, cousins and friends.
